MUZZLE-LOADER MATCH

19 FEBRUARY 2022

The Muzzle Loading Rifle Match on February 19, 2022, started out very cold but warmed up as the match went on. Early in the match there was no wind, but after the match finished the wind really picked up.

The ten competitors all had a very good time and most shot very well. We shot 25-yard pistol bullseye targets at 25 yards. Yes, we shot pistol targets with rifles and muskets.

We shot SB-7 targets with 4 bullseyes at 50 yards, Novelty bottle targets at 10 yards and FUN-1 targets (Better known as nightmare) also at 10 yards.

We shot a total of 30 patched roundballs in the match plus practice shots. Scoring was by NMLRA rules where the location of the shot center counts for the scoring on bullseye targets.


We intended to shoot pig silhouettes at 50 yards but based on feedback we decided to skip that relay.

This was a very close match with 1st and 2nd place being decided by the number of X shots. The same with 3rd and 4th place, the number of X shots determined 3rd place.

Gary Caines came in 1st; Chris Church came in 2nd and Matt Simoneau came in 3rd. This was the first time Matt had ever shot a muzzle loader, but I can almost guarantee that it won't be the last. Three of the shooters (Bill Christine, Sam Hartness and Josh Warman) were shooting flintlock smoothbores and were at a distinct disadvantage compared to the percussion rifle competitors, especially at 50 yards, but did well considering.

NRA Gun Safety Rules

Three Fundamental Rules For Safe Gun Handling

1. Always keep the gun pointed in a safe direction.

This is the primary rule of gun safety. A *safe direction* means that the gun is pointed so that even if it were to go off it would not cause injury or damage.

The key to this rule is to control where the muzzle or front end of the barrel is pointed at all times. Common sense dictates the safest direction, depending on different circumstances.

2. Always keep your finger off the trigger until ready to shoot.

When holding a gun, rest your finger on the trigger guard or along the side of the gun.
Until you are **actually ready to fire**, do not touch the trigger.

3. Always keep the gun unloaded until ready to use.

Whenever you pick up a gun, immediately engage the safety device if possible, and, if the gun has a magazine, remove it before opening the action and looking into the chamber(s) which should be clear of ammunition. If you do not know how to open the action or inspect the chamber(s), leave the gun alone and get help from someone who does.

REMEMBER... Calling the range hot or cold is just one step of a process. Prior to the range being called cold and the lights being turned on, it is then the responsibility of every shooter to agree that the range is cold, that everyone's gun is unloaded, that the actions are open, empty chamber indicators installed and that no guns are being handled.

Calling the range hot is the second step of a process. The first step of returning to a hot range is to visually make sure that all shooters have returned from down range and are once again behind the firing line.


